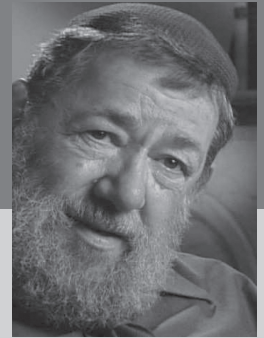

About Rabbi Arthur Green, PhD

Rabbi Green is rector of the Rabbinical School of Hebrew College and the Irving Brudnick Professor of Jewish Philosophy and Religion at Hebrew College. Recognized for his expertise in Jewish thought and spirituality and as a founder of the havurah movement, Dr. Green received his B.A. and Ph.D. from Brandeis University and his M.H.L. and rabbinical ordination from the Jewish Theological Seminary. He is professor emeritus at Brandeis University and previously taught at the University of Pennsylvania and the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College, where he served as dean and president (1984-1993).

Rabbi Green is both a historian of Jewish religion and a theologian; his work seeks to form a bridge between these two distinct fields. His extensive publications include *A Guide to the Zohar*, *Seek My Face: A Jewish Mystical Theology*, *Tormented Master: A Life of Rabbi Nahman of Bratslav*, *The Language of Truth: Teachings from the Sefat Emet*, and, most recently, *Radical Judaism: Rethinking God and Tradition*.
